On January 18, the Victims of Communism Memorial Foundation (VOC) proudly welcomed the Viet American Foundation to celebrate the official opening of our new temporary museum gallery on Vietnam's enduring fight for freedom against communism. Entitled "The Truth" the exhibit explores the communist takeover of the country, the brave Vietnamese who fought for freedom, and the ongoing oppression by the communist regime. The exhibit was curated by the Viet American Foundation.

On April 2, VOC and Hillsdale College hosted a book signing and discussion with Senator Tom Cotton on his must-read *Seven Things You Can't Say About China*. He spoke on how deeply the Chinese Communist Party has infiltrated America, how China persecutes Christians and commits genocide against religious and ethnic minorities, the alarming rise of China's armed forces and nuclear arsenal, and the danger our children face from China's influence on Hollywood, the NBA, TikTok, and so much more.



Educating the Next Generation

This year to date, VOC has educated over 450 students and trained 1,145 teachers on the history and horrors of communism. We host student groups for museum tours and presentations by experts and witnesses of communism as well as conduct teacher seminars both in person and online.

On March 11, the Crucial Communism Teaching Act was introduced in the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives. This bill makes curricular materials available through VOC to help educate high school students about the dangers of communism, and how such systems are contrary to the founding principles of freedom and democracy that we cherish in the United States.

Between the fourth edition of VOC's high school curriculum, Communism: Its Ideology, Its History, and Its Legacy, our free online advanced curriculum, teacher certification course, Witness Project documentary series, Ten Great Speeches Against Communism textbook, and the Victims of Communism Museum in Washington, D.C., we are proud to offer educational resources for teachers and students to study the criminal past and ongoing tyranny of communism.



VOC announces the election of Dr. Katrina Lantos Swett and Andrea Lauer Rice to its Board of Trustees. Dr. Lantos Swett serves as President of the Lantos Foundation for Human Rights and Justice, established in 2008 to continue the legacy of her father, the late Congressman Tom Lantos, who served as Chairman of the House Foreign Affairs Committee and was the only Holocaust survivor ever elected to the US Congress. Andrea Lauer Rice has served as President of the Hungarian American Coalition, the community's largest umbrella organization, for the past eight years, and is co-founder of Memory Project, an award-winning collection of 150 video-based life histories of Hungarians who immigrated to the US.
